Glass Collection Off to a Great Start

A new drop off area for source separated glass containers opened at the Recycling and Solid Waste Center in May. Because glass bottles and jars collected at the drop off are separate from other materials and with a higher degree of purity they can be recycled into new bottles and jars. This is a great option for residents that want their material to go to the best possible end use.

The drop off area accepts all colors of glass bottles and jars, and labels are okay. Please note that Pyrex, drinking glass, ceramics, window glass, and hazardous waste containers are not accepted, and lids should be removed. A small amount of contamination can spoil large amounts of material.

Residents who don't want to participate in the drop off are still encouraged to include glass containers in their single stream recycling set out. Glass collected curbside is used for landfill cover.

After two months, the clean glass roll off container is full of nearly 20 cubic yards of glass (approximately 7 tons) and will soon be hauled to a TOMRA facility for color sorting followed by delivery to bottle manufacturing facilities in Elmira Heights and Auburn.

Tburg Farmers' Market Drop Spot Opens

This Spring, TCRMM worked with the Trumansburg Farmers' Market to set up a drop spot that coincides with the market's hours of operation. The drop spot is open May through October every Wednesday from 4:30-7:30pm.

"The new drop spot hours provide a great opportunity for residents to recycle their food scraps while also enjoying the market's strong sense of community" said Barb Eckstrom,



Director. "Now they can pick up local produce, hear live music, and drop off their food scraps in one trip!"

The Food Scraps Recycling program provides free kitchen caddies and compostable liners to all residents who want to get started. These are available from the Recycling and Materials Management Office, and any drop spot. Paintcare Comes to New York

In 2019 New York State passed a law setting up PaintCare as a paint stewardship program for New York. Product stewardship programs and laws use funding from manufacturers to improve the recycling and handling of specific materials, and the program is now available throughout the state. PaintCare offers drop-off sites and pickup services, and now covers much of the cost of paint collection at Tompkins County Household Hazardous Waste events.
